तो लिख दी मैंने यही कविता, और इसमें अपनी कहानी बताई।



GANDHI JAYANTI - 2nd October










International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women

"A day in life of Sarita starts with getting ready for her office. With the daily warnings of her mother to come back home before dark she leaves for her office. The onward journey is full of lewd comments and inappropriate touches that are common for every girl travelling alone on a bus. Reaching the office (so called civilized place) the talks about molestation of one of her female colleagues by her boss fills up the sky. Leaving back for home at 6pm a fear surrounds her again. With Hundreds of glances over the watch, thousands of quick looks around, she reaches home and finally the battle for the day ends."

But, This is not just the story of Sarita nor of Emma, Atifa, or Amara but of many women today of the world who are still struggling for a safe environment at home, public spaces, or workplace.

The United Nations General Assembly has designated November 25 as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women to raise awareness of all forms of violence against women. This date was selected to honour the Mirabal sisters, three political activists from the Dominican Republic who were brutally murdered in 1960. Statically, 1 in 3 women worldwide have experienced physical and/or sexual violence in their lifetime. As many as 1 in 4 women experience physical and/or sexual violence during pregnancy. As many as 150 million girls worldwide are raped or subject to sexual violence each year. Shocking isn't it....? But it's only the tip of the iceberg. Violence can be prevented. Of course, it's not as straightforward as eradicating a virus like COVID. There is no vaccine, medication or cure. Prevention should start early in life, by educating and working with young boys and girls promoting respectful relationships and gender equality. Even, men should be made aware about this issue. Finally, the initiative must start from our homes. We must take concrete steps to prevent violence against women, because the question today is if not now, when?

International day on violence against women was celebrated on 25th November 1999 by United Nations General Assembly in the honor of Mirabal Sisters "Symbols of both popular and feminist resistance." The Sisters opposed the dictatorship of Rafael Trujillo and were murdered for it. It was shame for us then and it is a shame for us even today.

It was a decade long fight for women to win the right for vote in the United States. The Elizabeth Candy Stanton was one of the most active reformer to talk about this issue in the 18th century.
